### Investing in the Local Economy of Santa Cruz

Fostering greater access to economic opportunities is central to everything Amigos does. Our CECAP vocational programs focus on teaching new trades and business skills that empower entrepreneurs and promote local business development. Through targeted education and skill building programs, we are seeing real change in the economy

of Santa Cruz. Amigos also offers work opportunities through our training programs. We are proud to provide work to over 100 artisans, and to celebrate with recent Youth Corps intern graduates who are now fully employed in their area of study. This year we are supporting womenowned small businesses in mushroom cultivation and cooking.

Amigos works to promote economic empowerment that respects the dignity of each man and woman by improving their ability to earn a good income for themselves and their families, not just depend on handouts. Economic empowerment leads to healthier families and more educated youth, improving the wellbeing of the entire community.

### Higher Education is on the rise!

When Amigos was founded in 1998, only 6 students graduated from primary school in Santa Cruz, and few yet dreamed of high school. Our secondary scholarship program started in 2002, with support for 6 students to go on to high school for the first time. We have now seen over 90 of our scholarship recipients graduate from high school, and Amigos' own Co-Director of CECAP, Estela Simaj, became the first woman to graduate from university last year! This year, we are proud to

support 29 high school and 10 university scholarship students - our largest cohort yet. Higher education is now a possibility for Santa Cruz youth. Those first few students paved the way for the next generation, and interest in scholarships grows with each passing year. Both boys and girls now have the opportunity to pursue their studies and choose a professional career path. Education remains at the heart of Amigos' work, and it is the key to alleviating poverty for the people of Santa Cruz.



Meet Manuel, son of Maria, a single mom. He was the first in his family to complete primary and then secondary school. A graduate of our first Youth Corps group, he is now employed full-time as an accountant.

# Healthy Homes for Our Artísans

Over 100 women are now earning an income through Amigossupported businesses initiatives. This year, we combined economic opportunities with support for healthier homes to help these women sustain a better life for themselves and their families. We work with all of our artisans to ensure that their homes are equipped with quality water filters so that they and their families enjoy a healthy living environment. We monitor and provide assistance to mothers whose children suffer from malnutrition, to ensure that they receive treatment and education. And we conduct nutritional recipe trainings, encouraging healthy eating and family gardens so that young children receive the nutrition they need to learn and grow.

This holistic approach combines economic empowerment with overall health and wellbeing. It allows us to target support to our artisans where it is needed. And it is providing the knowledge, skills and opportunities they need to attain a better life.

# Encouraging a Love for Reading

Meet Manuela – Early Education Specialist

Our early education model classroom program is aimed at improving the quality of public education in Santa Cruz. It is now in its 5<sup>th</sup> year and reaches over 135 children in preschool through 2nd grade. This year we expanded the program to include an extra afternoon reading session and lending library – the only active lending library in

Santa Cruz. Many parents in our village still do not themselves read and write, and books are rarely found in the home. The reading program aims to introduce young children to a love for reading that they will carry with them for the rest of their lives.

Manuela Simón Pérez coordinates this program. Here she tells us why she thinks it is making a difference.

### Why do you think this program is needed?

Children need an opportunity to read and think creatively. Public school classrooms here in Guatemala are very structured, and this program provides an opportunity for students to enjoy reading, to think critically, and to express their opinions. This will help them grow to be stronger and more successful adults.

#### Are you seeing a difference?

It was difficult to get the children to attend at first, but now they even arrive early! Their reading ability is clearly improving, but also their enthusiasm and participation which is just as important.

### How would you like to see this program grow in the future?

Right now we are only able to work with a limited number of students. I would like to have all children in Santa Cruz participate and develop a love for reading. I would also like to see the parents themselves become more involved.

Thanks to generous support from the John Brown Family Foundation and Innocent Eyes Project, our early education programs will continue to work with these young learners through the end of their primary school studies.

#### **BUSINESS HIGHLIGHT**

Mushroom Cultivation in Jaibalito

**What:** Women's Mushroom Cultivation Business

*Who:* Group of 8 women, 20-40 years old

Where: Jaibalito, a smaller village just west of Santa Cruz

Why: To take advantage of high demand and low supply of mushrooms in the area. Mushroom production requires relatively low investment cost and quick harvests, providing for a short turnaround period for income generation.

How: Amigos worked with the local women to identify the business opportunity, learn how to cultivate mushrooms and establish a production center, and provide ongoing technical assistance to support the buisness with production and commercialization.

### Putting Santa Cruz to Work

CECAP's business initiatives are taking off, providing more work for the community and a sustainable source of income to help support Amigos' programs.

Manos Cruceñas artisan store and Café Sabor Cruceño are two social enterprise businesses run by Amigos. They provide work to CECAP graduates, and income from their sales is helping us to meet our goal of sustainability for CECAP. They currently employ over 80 artisans and culinary graduates from the community.

#### Culinary Graduate Teaches Guatemalan Cooking

Guatemalan cooking classes, offered by staff from our graduaterun Café Sabor Cruceño, are taking off! Participants learn to make traditional Guatemalan dishes with indigenous head chef, Claudia Cumes. Claudia offers hands-on cooking demonstrations and explains the role that these dishes play in the culture and community of Santa Cruz, followed by a delicious lunch on our rooftop patio.

### Expanding Sexual and Reproductive Health

### Education for All

Amigos has provided sexual and reproductive health education (SRH) in all public schools in Santa Cruz since 2014, reaching over 1,000 students. Early marriage and teen pregnancy can greatly impede a young person's access to an education and freedom to choose their own future. We provide the youth of Santa Cruz with the information and resources needed to help them avoid unplanned pregnancies, empower them to make healthy and responsible decisions about



their bodies and their lives, and consider marraige as more mature adults. An important part of this program is training and preparing public school teachers to integrate these important topics into their regular curriculum. Previously, few public school teachers covered sexual and reproductive health due to cultural taboos and their own lack of knowledge. Now,

with the training and resources provided by Amigos, they are increasingly starting to see the benefits of more educated and aware youth, and willingly teach the classes themselves. Investment in teacher training ensures a long-term and sustainable change in access to SRH education for all Santa Cruz youth.


## Building Indigenous Leadership Within Amigos



Amigos is proud of our local staff! Of our 22 staff and 12 interns, all but two are indigenous youth leaders from Santa Cruz and surrounding towns.

Empowering local staff is what Amigos is all about. They are the first generation to pursue an education in Santa Cruz, and many were scholarship recipients of Amigos. their community. They are gaining knowledge and experience as young professionals, and learning the skills to ensure high quality work in everything that we do. By employing young adults from the community, we are working toward a generational change in Santa Cruz.
